English Layman to Receive Invalids in Chapel in Twenty-fifth Street INVITED BY DR. MANNING

Rector of Parish on Episcopal Committee to Report on Methods of J. M. Hickson

James Moore Hickson, a layman of the Church of England, will conduct a second healing mission this week in Trinity Episcopal Chapel in Twenty-fifth Street, west of Broadway. Admission is to be by ticket only, according to the Rev. J. Wilson Sutton, vicar of the chapel.

The mission is under the auspices of Trinity Church but is held at the chapel because of the more convenient location. A closing service for Mr. Hickson will be held next Sunday afternoon in old Trinity at 3:30 o'clock, and he will end his mission here on Friday. His mission was to have continued a month, but he found this impossible. Mr. Hickson will conduct a mission in Brooklyn and also will go to Boston.

Telling of cures, Mr. Hickson said his method was simply the laying on of hands, but had nothing to do with Christian Science or New Thought. He said he used the methods of the disciples.

Hickson has held healing missions in several cities since his visit here a year ago, when he received hundreds of invalids in Trinity Chapel. So great an impression did his work make among clergymen that, at the last General Convention of the Episcopal Church in Detroit, a commission was appointed to study his methods and to report back at the next triennial convention.

One of the members of this Episcopal committee is the Rev. Dr. William T. Manning, rector of Trinity, who brought Hickson to the city a year ago, and induced him to return this week. Hickson had planned last year to take a trip around the world, conducting healing missions, but stayed in this country because of the interest shown in his work here.

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
